






**CALLS FOR SERVICE** Data includes requests for services and self initiated activity by officers in preventive enforcement operations. Analysis: In reviewing the statistics the 09 calls for service are less than 08 figures. Contributing factors include that repetitive violators were addressed in 08, whereas many were incarcerated most of 09. It was also found the a high degree of preventive patrol tactics aided in having those not arrested to move from the jurisdiction. 10 was slightly lower than 09 in that preventive sweeps - gang and probation were conducted resulting in numerous paroles and probationers being placed back into custody




**CHART 2:** **MUTUAL AID** Includes all mutual aid requests by other law enforcement, fire, medical field units, and any other agencies. Analysis: Mutual aid is not being formally requested any longer. Because of personnel shortages by all the law enforcement agencies of Glenn County, mutual aid has become a normal response. In as such the documenting of the mutual aid has become less reported. Adjustments have been made in data collection for 10 to counter the normalcy aspect to obtain a better record of providing the service to other agencies. As predicted the 10 stats came in lower with the adjustments



**CHART 3:** **TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS** Data includes all traffic accidents, including injury, non-injury, hit and run types of collisions.  
Analysis: Changes in state requirements and department procedures has ensured a clearer capture of traffic accident data. While the overall number of collisions has deminished, the number of injury collisions has increased.




**CHART 4:** **TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT ACTIONS** Data includes citations issued and warnings given  
Analysis: The data from 95 to 07 only reflect traffic citations issued. As of 08 data collection began on all enforcement stops. This includes citations as well as warnings. In reviewing the ratio of warnings to citations issue it was found that the average was 5 warnings to 1 citation. The overall mission for traffic enforcement is a promote safe driving. The concern is where the warnings are high in ratio to citations and the number of injury collisions has increased. The department is carefully watching and modifying the enforcement tactics to enhance safe driving. The Avoid the 5, Click it or tickets, distracted driver programs have shown a positive result in less enforcement contacts

**DUI ARRESTS** Data includes all arrests including DUI arrests made through Avoid 5 OTS grants.


Analysis: This is the second year of the Avoid the 5 DUI grant through the Office of Traffic Safety. 08 reflected a notable spike when officers on OT were now on directed enforcement operations for the arrest of DUI violators. Through these efforts and the awareness by the Willows community in 08 and early 09 that DUI will not be tolerated the 09 figures declined. More persons are using designated drivers or other means. Basically persons are more leery of drinking and driving because of the fear of being caught. Avoid the 5, and state and national anti DUI campaigns are having a positive impact. This coupled with high visibility has been positive.



**CHART 6:**

**AUTO THEFTS** Data includes all stolen reports taken by the Willows Police Department

Analysis: With the 03 - 04 spike, the number of cars stolen in Willows has declined. The 09 chart line shows a decrease whereas the actual decrease is 1 less stolen. At the same time residents have become aware of locking their cars and better at not leaving a car running with the keys in the ignition. The arrest in late 09 of a auto theft ring resulted in a reduction of overall auto thefts in 10.




**CHART 7:**

**ASSAULTS**


Data includes all felony and misdemeanor assaults and batteries reported to Willows Police

Analysis: 02 and 04 show spikes of increase in both levels of assaults/batteries. In 07 the Willows Police in cooperation with the probation department began probation/gang sweeps. This resulted in the most repetitive offenders being incarcerated. Gang activity has been in the decline. In 10 many of the key players of the local gangs are expected to be released. It is anticipated that with their releases the assaults/batteries very well may increase. In 10 the misdemeanor assaults have dropped while the felony assaults noted an increase.




**CHART 8:**

**THEFT CASES** Data includes all thefts, including shoplifting, residential, commercial and vehicular (except auto theft & robberies)  
Analysis: A review of the 08 and 09 theft activities found that a good number of the petty thefts are shoplifting related. The most common reporter was WalMart. A concern is that with the new Super Center the store will have a higher degree of store security, plus will be open 24/7 that the petty theft (shoplifting) figures will drastically increase. For 10 both the felony (grand) theft and misdemeanor (petty thefts are below the 16 year average. The high points reflect periods with less police presence.



**CHART 9:** **ADULT ARRESTS** Data includes all felony and misdemeanor arrests made by the Willows Police Department.  
 Analysis: As found with the 08 figures there were notably more misdemeanor adult arrests than in 09. It was found that many of those arrested in 08 were sentenced in 09 and therefore were in custody. Misdemeanor charges carry a 1 year maximum sentence. Many of the regular offenders will be released in 10. At the same time felony arrests are on a continued rise from 08 to 09. The numbers for 10 reflect that many of the major players were in custody. Preventive probation, parole and gang sweeps returned many to custody. Parole and probation violations are not reflected as new on view arrests




**CHART 10:**

Data includes all juvenile arrests and contact by Willows Police


Analysis: Felony activity by juveniles has remained fairly consistent. Misdemeanor arrests increased for 09 over 08 figures. Regardless the number of law enforcement contacts with juveniles has increased. It is believed that with the closure of the AMH Theater and will little other recreational resources that juveniles are finding themselves with an abundance of time. The result is hanging around parks and the streets. This is supported by the increase in juvenile misdemeanor arrests. Thankfully the juvenile numbers dropped for contacts and misdemeanor arrests. The felony arrests however did increase.

**DOMESTIC VIOLENCE** Data includes all calls for service involving domestic violence


Analysis: Although slightly higher in 09 than in 08 the DV activity is not climbing at an alarming rate. As the economy continues to falter and persons are forced into economic hardships, the strain on many households many result in an increase of DV. The creation of a DVERT Team along with a DV Shelter is being worked on. These programs will empower many DV victims that are currently not reporting the violence to do so. With the continuance of a poor economy we have seen a dynamic increase in domestic violence calls. Additionally the severity of injuries sustained by the victims has increased. Domestic violence calls are the leading killer of police officers.



**CHART 12:**

**BURGLARIES** Data includes all reported burglaries to residences, businesses and vehicles

Analysis: In 08 the city experienced a spike in residential burglaries. Through good investigations the habitual burglars were identified and arrested. Major burglars in jail resulted in less burglaries. Also a campaign to lock door and windows was began in mid 08. This may have also created target hardening. At the same time commercial burglaries are showing a slight increase. It has found that many of the older building have poor security. Crime prevention efforts have began to correct this. Auto burglaries have notable decreased. Public education campaigns to lock cars and not leave valuables in plain view has added to target removal. In 10 we noted a major increase in residential burglaries. There was a slight increase in commercial burglaries and a major increase in auto burglaries




**CHART 13:**

**ALL DRUG OFFENSES**

Data reflects all calls/activities involving drug enforcement

Analysis: Drug offenses are down. Actual use of drugs in Glenn County and the City of Willows is not necessarily less, however drug abusers are maintaining a very low profile. The habitual offenders has been arrested in 08, violated probation in 08 and 09 and many are now jailed. While these offenders are in custody the number of drug offenses will drop. When they are released, many will return to drug abuse and begin the cycle again. In 10 the number of 11550 arrests showed a notable increase.

**11550 H&S ARRESTS**

Data reflects all arrests for person under the influence of drugs

Analysis: Same as the drug abuse chart, the under the influence of drug arrests has declined basically because those who are under the influence on a regular basis are now in the mid cycle of jail and are to be returned to the community in 10.

As predicted many of the previous 11550 offenders have returned to the streets only to be observed and subsequently arrests climbed.
