

Engineering Division

City Swimming Pool Repairs

The City Council approved Aquatic Design Group to design the construction drawings to repair the City Swimming Pool in time for the 2024 summer swim season. Once construction drawings are complete, the city will go out to bid for construction.



South Tehama Street Water Line Main Extension Project

Council approved a resolution authorizing the City Manager to execute an agreement with Allen Gill Construction to complete the project, which is projected to begin in August.

Planning Division -Major Project Updates

Beverage House Market

A public hearing for a Design Review of the façade for the new Beverage House

Market. The Beverage House Market is

moving into the old Circle K building located on Wood Street when entering the city limits. The Planning Commission reviewed and approved the proposed plans for the façade and requested some minor alterations to the colors at the Jun 21 PC meeting.



What does a City Planner do?

Currently, there are 11 development projects underway in the Planning Division (e.g., hotel, Jack-in-the-Box). In addition, the City Planner also assists with approving commercial signs, shepherding commercial and residential developers through the permitting process, and fielding questions from the public regarding potential planning or building project ideas. Larger development projects may take several months and even years to guide through the permitting process to completion. City Planner work focuses on maintaining the approved standards in the Municipal Code, as well as ensuring development is consistent with the City's approved General Plan, Housing Element and Zoning Code. In addition, Planners confirm that project development on a given property is consistent with the development standards of adjacent and surrounding properties. All planning and development projects and applications are reviewed by the City Planner to ensure consistency with the City's Municipal Code.

Public Works Division

New Drinking Fountain

A new drinking fountain/bottle filling station was installed in Jensen Park. The Public Works team trenched and installed a new water line to accommodate the new hydration facility near the center of the park so that it would be easily accessible to both gazebos. This fountain was funded by CalRecycle from the City's portion of deposit fees collected with the purchase of each single use bottle or can.






Civic Center Flooding

On June 1, the lobby water fountain mysteriously turned on after City Hall was closed and continued to flow throughout the night causing considerable flooding. When staff arrived in the morning, there was one to two inches of standing water in the main lobby extending from the library and Council Chamber doors to City Hall's public counter, as well as the short hallway leading to the public bathrooms. Public Works staff acted quickly to stop the water flow by disabling the fountain. A local carpet specialist was called and within 15 minutes restoration was underway. The water was removed, fans were strategically located, and by 10 am, City Hall was open and ready for business.





Pedestrian Signs

There are several public safety yield signs in crosswalks near schools and in the downtown area to remind drivers that pedestrians may be crossing and have the right of way when in the crosswalk. They also add a layer of pedestrian safety beyond the painted crosswalks. Almost every month a sign is hit by a passing vehicle damaging it in place or dragging it away. These signs cost \$500 each. Please be cautious and mindful when on the road, especially when driving in these areas of the city - both for the sake of the pedestrians and to avoid damaging expensive taxpayer property. It's hot - especially for Public Works Maintenance Workers!

During these hot summer months and as soon as it hits 80 degrees, Federal and State Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) laws must be adhered to by the City.

While the City's Maintenance Workers are outside working and keeping operations running smoothly, the city takes extra precautions to ensure they are hydrated, offer cooling off areas and periods, and provide additional shade as needed to ensure their health and safety. In addition, employees must work in pairs to monitor each other for any signs of heat exhaustion and/or dehydration. Something to consider the next time Public Works employees are observed taking a break in the middle of the day.

Summer Swim Season

The City contracted with Willows Unified School District again to use their pool for the 2023 summer swim season. Summer staffing included one manager and nine full-time lifeguards. The city enjoyed a successful opening day on Thursday, June 15 and, in the month of June, the pool has hosted a total of 474 swimmers. The hours of operation are 1-5 pm, Monday through Saturday. The summer swim program will run until August 5, 2023.





Youth Basketball Camp



Summer Soccer Camp



Tyler Technologies - Transition Continues


Over the past month, department staff have been working four to six hours per day to configure Tyler's payroll module in the City's new accounting software. This week, staff ran



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the first parallel payroll (e.g., mock) ensuring that the new system is correctly configured and matching employee payroll information with the previous MOMS software system.

Accounts Payable (AP) and Accounts Receivable (AR) are now being processed in the Tyler system as of the month of June. There have been a few minor issues along the way and during the transition; however, they have been ironed out and new procedures have been instituted. Moving forward, running AP and AR should be much smoother.



FIREFire Response, Prevention & Emergency Medical Services

EMERGENCY HIGHLIGHTS

Commercial Structure Fire

On June 3, Willows Fire
Department (WFD) was
dispatched to 640 Canton
Street for a reported
commercial structure fire. The



initial engine company arrived to find a vacant commercial building engulfed with fire. Automatic aid from Orland and Artois were enlisted per standard mutual aid agreements. Firefighters initiated an aggressive interior attack, achieving knock down and saving 75% of the building. After investigation, the fire was determined to have been started in the vegetation outside of the structure. The cause is listed as undetermined and suspicious.

Vegetation Fire

On June 15, WFD was dispatched to a vegetation fire at I-5 and Juniper Drive. Units arrived at the scene to find a vegetation fire burning in dry grass threatening several homes. Units contained the fire before damage to homes occurred. The cause of the fire was listed as undetermined and suspicious.

Vehicle Accident

On June 16, WFD was dispatched for a traffic collision between CR 68 and CR 57 on I-5. Units arrived on the scene to find one vehicle with major damage. Units triaged the accident and established incident command. Despite best efforts, there were three fatalities and one patient was transported to the hospital.

Trailer Fire

On June 27, the WFD was dispatched to a vehicle fire in Kanawha Fire Protection District (KFPD). Units arrived to find a fully involved and fire engulfed hay trailer. WFD established command and initiated fire attack, achieving knock down on the fire. Upon arrival of KFPD, command was transferred and WFD units returned to Willows.


New Command Vehicle


Willows Fire Department (WFD) is thrilled to announce the delivery of its brand-new Command Vehicle! This vehicle will replace Utility 7, a 2003 Chevrolet pickup truck that has been in service for 20 years. The replacement was made possible through a CALFIRE Hazardous Fuels Reduction Grant.



The grant funded 100% of the cost to procure this new WFD Command Vehicle including the emergency lighting package, camper shell, and decals.

On scene command capabilities make or break incidents. Ensuring command staff quickly and safely arrive at the scene of an emergency and take charge is a priority, especially when it is complex and dynamic. WFD is proud to finally show everyone this new Command Vehicle that is ready to serve the community of Willows for many years to come!




