

# Fiscal Emergency & 1% Sales Tax

On October 10, 2023, the City Council declared a fiscal emergency and placed a 1% sales tax on the Presidential Primary ballot on March 5, 2024. As the financial forecasting model below illustrates, short of an immediate increase in revenue, the City will deplete its General Fund Reserve during Fiscal Year 2024-25.

The fiscal emergency is primarily a result of the abrupt \$1 million increase in the cost of the City's law enforcement agreement with the Glenn County Sheriff's Office between fiscal year 2022-23 and 2023-24. A cost that is ongoing and likely to grow in the coming years as increases in the County's expenses (e.g., salaries, pensions, fuel costs, overall inflation) are passed on to the City.



# **City Council Authorizes Hiring Freeze!**

In response to the City's current fiscal crisis, the Council approved a hiring freeze at the Tuesday, November 14 City Council Meeting until after the March 5, 2024 election. Currently, that only impacts the Finance Department as the Finance & Human Resources Specialist is the only budget approved position that remains vacant.

#### **November 14 Council Meeting**

- Approved Update to the job classification title of the Finance & Human Resources Analyst position to "Finance & Human Resources Specialist."
- Approved Fiscal year 2023-2024 appropriations limit.
- Directed City staff to amend the scope of work for the four million dollar Clean California Grant project to include funding for the City pool rehabilitation.
- Approved The revised temporary law enforcement agreement with the Glenn County Sheriff's Office.
- Continued Discussion of "Future Short- and Long-Term Options for Law Enforcement Services" to the November 28 City Council meeting.
- Approved \$10,000 towards a City education action plan for the 1% City Sales Tax Measure on the March Ballot.

# Staying Safe and Secure this Holiday Season!

As we approach the holiday season, the City of Willows wants to encourage residents to have a safe and joyous holiday with their loved ones.



Decorating is one of the best ways to get in a holiday mood, but emergency rooms see thousands of injuries involving holiday decorating every season.

When decorating the tree and house, please follow these guidelines:

- Keep potentially poisonous plants mistletoe, holly berries, Jerusalem cherry and amaryllis away from children.
- If using an artificial tree, check that it is labeled "fire resistant."
- If using a live tree, cut off about 2 inches of the trunk to expose fresh wood for better water absorption, remember to water it and remove it from the home

- when it is dry.
- Place the tree at least three feet away from fireplaces, radiators, and other heat sources, making certain not to block doorways.
- Avoid placing breakable ornaments or ones with small, detachable parts on lower tree branches where small children can reach them.
- Only use indoor lights indoors and outdoor lights outdoors, and choose the right ladder for the task when hanging lights.
- Replace light sets that have broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires, or loose connections.
- Follow the package directions on the number of light sets that can be plugged into one socket.
- Never nail, tack, or stress wiring when hanging lights and keep plugs off the ground away from water.
- Turn off all lights and decorations when you go to bed or leave the house.
- Place candles where they cannot be knocked down or blown over and out of reach of children.
- Keep matches and lighters up high and out of reach of children in a locked cabinet.
- Use flameless, rather than lighted, candles near flammable objects.
- Don't burn trees, wreaths or wrapping paper in the fireplace.
- Always use a screen on the fireplace when a fire is burning.
- Never leave candles or fireplaces burning unattended or when you are asleep.
- Check and clean the chimney and fireplace area at least once per year.



# **FIRE**Fire Response, Prevention & Emergency Medical Services

#### **EMERGENCY HIGHLIGHTS**

#### **Vegetation Fire**

On October 8, WFD responded to the Orland area for a large vegetation fire in Stoney Creek (as part of the City's regular Automatic Aid agreement). Resources were engaged for



several hours. The regional Automatic Aid agreements with Orland and Artois Fire Department have been crucial in ensuring all three departments are able to respond and mitigate large scale incidents in a timely and resource efficient manner.

#### **Residential Fire**

On October 30, WFD was dispatched to a residential structure fire in the area of North Butte Street and First Avenue. The career Fire Engine arrived at the scene to find fire and smoke billowing from the structure and immediately initiated an aggressive offensive fire attack. The fire was extinguished by fire personnel and the property was turned back over to the property owner. The Fire was deemed unintentional, and no injuries were reported. Special thank you to Artois and Orland Fire Departments for providing Automatic aid.

#### **Fire Prevention Week**

Fire Prevention week was October 8-14. During the week, Willows Firefighters visited Walden Academy and Murdock School to educate the children on fire safety and prevention. Children learned about smoke detectors, what to do in a fire, building a Family Fire Escape Plan, and the tools and equipment firefighters use to do their jobs.

#### **TRAINING**


